Kindergarten Requirements:

Before your child may enter school in September, your child's physician must complete the following requirements:

- 1. A physical exam that is not older than one year (Sept. 2021- Sept. 2022)
- 2. Proof of the following immunizations:
 - 5 doses of DPT (diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis)
 - 4 doses of oral polio
 - 2 doses of MMR (measles, mumps and rubella)
 - 3 doses of hepatitis B
 - 2 dose of Varicella or proof of immunity
- 3. A copy of a lead level test result (any result date is fine)
- 4. Certification that your child has passed both acuity (ability to see objects far away) and stereopsis (how well two eyes work together) screenings is required. There is a section on the Massachusetts School Health Record where results are recorded.

Kindergarten Screening:

The following form should be completed and returned to the School Nurse during kindergarten screening:

- 1. Developmental History
- 2. Dial 3 Parent Questionnaire

The following forms must be returned no later than August 1, 2022

- 1. Certificate of Immunization (if immunizations are complete)
- 2. Massachusetts School Health Record (if 5 year physical has been completed)

Building Literacy Skills at Home

Kindergarten is an exciting year in the world of literacy, as you watch your child's literacy skills develop. There are many activities that you can do at home to help your child's literacy skills flourish. Below are some ideas:

- 1. **READ to your child every day**. This is so important for the development of vocabulary, language and literacy skills. This can be a special time for you and your child to foster the love of literature.
- 2. Help your child develop phonemic awareness. Young children do not hear the isolated phonemes/sounds in words. You can help them by playing games that reinforce this skill. For example, say a word like "top" and break it into phonemes, /t/, /o/, /p/. Another activity is switching phonemes. For example, say the word "mat" and then change it to "hat," "bat," etc.
- 3. Practice letter names and their sounds. There are loads of alphabet games available. Guide your child to match letter names with their corresponding sounds using alphabet cards, blocks, cut-outs, etc.
- 4. Have lots of conversations with your child. Providing exposure to language helps build literacy skills.
- 5. Ask your child to tell you story. Write the story down and read the story back to your child using your finger to track and point to words as you read. This gets children used to reading left to right. Repeated readings will help them to recognize words.
- 6. Practice vowels versus consonants. Create a sorting activity, helping your child sort letter cards or letter cut-outs into a vowel group and a consonant group. Using a different color for vowels and consonants is helpful. Then ask or help your child name the vowels and consonants.
- 7. Encourage your child to read to you. Once your child begins reading books, encourage him/her to read to you. Choose books that are at a comfortable reading level for your child and encourage repeated readings to help build fluency skills.
- 8. Provide opportunities to practice writing. Write a letter, a postcard, a list or a story with your child.
- 9. Ask questions when reading. Whether you are reading to your child or he/she is reading to you, comprehension skills develop as you ask questions about the story. Ask who, what, where, when, and why questions. Ask about the important events in the story.
- 10. Have FUN. Most importantly, bring the spirit of fun to whatever activity you are doing so that reading becomes a pleasure and not a chore.

LIBRARY

Ms. Samantha Silag is the MERSD Elementary Library Teacher at MMES and EES. The school library is a learner-laboratory that supports, extends and differentiates MERSD curriculum with the district-wide goal of developing future-ready graduates. The school library serves as the information hub in our school. Collaboration with all disciplines and full integration of technology is assumed as an integral part of our 21st Century Skills model. Specifically, our 21st Century Skills Curriculum Goals include:

Collection Development - Library materials support and extend the core curriculum; serve the needs and interests of students and staff; stimulate intellectual curiosity; and nurture a love of reading.

Research Skills - Developmentally appropriate, inquiry-based projects move students from guided practice to development of more independent information literacy skills including exploration of resources and ethical use of information.

Organizing Information - Pragmatic library instruction fosters the ability to identify, appreciate and pursue materials based on an understanding of the library's layout & organizational tenets - both physical and philosophical.

Cultural Proficiency - Diverse cultures, social awareness, global experiences and points of view are introduced and represented via collection development practices, library lessons, storytelling and discussion. Social context and self-awareness are identified as key components of "cultural intelligence."

MUSIC

Ms. Fiona Dooley is the MMES Music Teacher and Choral Director. Music class is full of music-making for all of Memorial's students. Students of all ages sing the songs they already love as well as songs that are new to them. We use a Kodaly-based curriculum to improve students' sense of pitch and rhythm through singing, movement, and games. All students play handheld percussion and begin to improvise. Students in 3rd grade and up also play ukuleles, mallet instruments, and handbells. At every level, students place music in its cultural and historical context and use their imaginations to associate music with emotions and ideas. 5th graders use those imaginative skills to compose their own melodies. The goal of our music classroom is to instill a love of music in every student, so finally, music class should be funl

TECHNOLOGY

Mrs. Jenna Seymour is the MERSD Elementary Technology Teacher at MMES and EES. The Technology Program utilizes 21st century skills to promote learning through technology. The goal of our program is to help our students become critical thinkers, effective problem solvers and creative collaborators. Through the use of technology in the technology lab and its integration throughout the school, our students have access to technology in all parts of their curriculum throughout any day. Our technology curriculum includes:

- Learning about Digital Citizenship
- Computer Coding and Robotics
- Google Apps for Education: Google Classroom, Docs, Sheets, Slides
- Utilizing various multimedia production tools: Kidpix, Neighborhood Map Machine, Graph Club
- Gaming to promote learning: Math Blasters, Digital Passport, Cross Country USA
- Integrating multimedia apps into curriculum learning: Book Creator Coding Journals, American President Chatterpix, Author Study Morfos, American Revolution Green Screens.

Building Math Skills at Home

Two basic Numeracy Skills that are important for your child's success are Counting and Number Recognition. Below are just a few suggestions for building these skills. As always, make it fun!

<u>Count Everything:</u> The best way to build "number sense" and make the 1,2,3s meaningful is to add counting to your everyday routine. You can count the number of cars on the street, the number of grapes on your plate, the steps in your house, or anything else you can think of!

<u>Hunt For Numbers</u>: Number hunts are a fun and engaging activity. Ask your child to find numbers around you. Say the numbers on houses, signs, calendars and catalogues. Grocery stores have an endless amount of numbers displayed.

<u>Use Playing Cards</u>: Playing with cards is a fun activity. Play matching games like 'Snap'. Order numbers from smallest to largest, or largest to smallest. Play 'War'. "I SPY" is also another way to learn numbers. Lay out a 3×4 arrangement of number cards, using 2 through 10. Say "I Spy the number 5, or 8, etc. As your child picks up the cards, replace them with new.

<u>Labeling:</u> Place numbers on objects around your house. For example, place a "12" on a dozen eggs, a "2" on a pair of shoes, etc.

<u>Dice Games</u>: Grab two dice and a piece of paper with the numbers 2 through twelve written on it. Roll the dice, count all the dots, and circle each number until you've rolled them all.

<u>Count and Sort</u>: Label cups, eggs crates, or other containers with the numbers 1 through 12. Using any type of counter, have your child fill each container with the correct amount.

<u>Number Identification</u>: Lay out a set of number cards 1 through 12 and ask your child to point to the "8" or the "6". You can also ask them to point to the number that comes after "5" or before "9". Have a set of counters handy to match numbers with quantities. Find pictures of objects and have your child match the number to the quantity of objects.

HORNETS AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM



The Hornet's After School Program is a full time after school program that offers a safe, supportive alternative between school and home for the children of Manchester-by-the-Sea in grades K - 5. The Hornet's After School Program is run by the Manchester Parks and Recreation Department. Heather DePriest, the Program Director for the Parks and Recreation Department has run the After School Program since its inception in January 2007.

The staff of the Hornets After School Program are chosen carefully and must meet the strict requirements of the Massachusetts Department of Early Education & Care, who is our licensing body. Qualities such as warmth, willingness to learn, patience, teamwork, flexibility, and professionalism are just some of the criteria used for hiring and evaluating the staff. Requirements also include various staff trainings throughout the year. We are very excited to begin another school year and look forward to your child joining us. The Hornets After School Program also follows all the CDC Guidelines to ensure the safety of staff and the participants.

Activities include outdoor play, gym games, organized arts and crafts, homework time, seasonal activities, and daily snack time (snack is included). The program runs every school day from 3:00-6:00PM at the Manchester Memorial School. Parents have the option of sending their children either one, two, three, four or five days a week. Tuition is paid monthly on the first of each month for the previous month's use. Please pack appropriate clothes because we will play outside as much as we can!
