Manchester Essex Regional High School (MERHS) offers a vibrant assortment of clubs, groups, organizations and extra-curricular activities open to all students.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

MERHS offers a High School Concert Band, High School Pep Band, and High School Jazz Band. The Concert Band meets during the school day and there are options to take it every day or on every odd day of the rotation. The Jazz Band rehearses during the evening. Members of the Concert Band are required to participate in the High School Pep Band, performing at school rallies and home football



games. Required performances of the Concert Band include Winter and Spring Concerts, Veterans Day assembly, Memorial Day assembly and parade, the Manchester Tree Lighting, and the Council on Aging St. Patrick's Day Dinner and Concert. The Jazz Band performs at the Winter and Spring Concerts as well as the annual Evening of Jazz Concert. It is expected that members of the Jazz Band participate in the High School Concert Band, and all students will be encouraged to audition for district festivals. A performance trip is planned for the High School Concert Band every other year.

CONCERT CHOIR

MERHS offers a High School Concert Choir to interested students in grades 9-12. The Full Choir meets during the school days, and it is offered at both College Prep and Honors levels. New and experienced singers work together to learn proper vocal techniques, sight-singing, and ensemble skills. Students learn to perform a variety of musical styles and genres that include standard choral works, spirituals, and musical theater selections. Most



music is arranged in four-part harmony for soprano, alto, alto two/tenor, and bass. Required performances include the annual Winter and Spring concerts, town tree lighting ceremonies, the high school awards ceremony, and school assemblies. Advanced students are encouraged to audition for the high school a cappella group, the SoundWaves, as well as the Northeast Senior District Festival in the fall and All-State competition in the winter.

SOUNDWAVES

SoundWaves is the high school's select A Cappella group. It is offered as an Honors- level course, and it meets twice a week after school hours. styles of music, including arrangements of contemporary songs, pop, jazz, folk tunes, madrigals, patriotic songs and holiday music.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY (NHS)

Eligibility is based on a student's grade point average at the second semester of either sophomore or junior year, which has to be at minimum overall of 4.35. As a member of NHS, a student is required to complete five hours of community service each quarter, including one group effort each semester. Some examples of community service include collecting candy after Halloween for Operation Gratitude soldiers, tutoring middle school and high school students, and canned goods drives. A 4.35 grade point average (GPA) must be maintained throughout the school years that members are participating in NHS. Failure to maintain the GPA requirement could result in academic probation and a possible termination of membership. All chapter meetings must be attended promptly by all members, which occur at the second Tuesday of every month (unless otherwise noted). Failure to comply with these policies will lead to consequences determined by NHS officers and advisors.


NATIONAL ART HONOR SOCIETY (NAHS)


ANTI-DEFAMATION LEAGUE (ADL) – A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE
